#### From our Trainer

Hello friends! We hope you have been surviving the cold weather and making some time to enjoy your horses. Don't forget about our haul-in packages - no need to be working your horses on bad footing. Speaking of footing... we have some exciting news! The owners Bob and Susan have upgraded the footing in our indoor arena! They followed the recommendation of Brad Lund and added some "Pond Fill" which is a very interesting sand mixture. Our Barn Manager Dusty LaBeth spread it for us with the skid steer and we now have world class footing to go with the world class facility! This footing is versatile and great for many different disciplines. It will hold moisture better and it will not pack and harden like our old footing did. This means less maintenance for us and a better riding surface for you!

Another great improvement is the addition of more bleacher seating continuing down the east arena wall. That wall is straight now which will allow us to host cowhorse events in the future. This brings me to my next announcement: Brad Lund will be putting on a clinic here at EC March 17th. It is a one day intensive with ten hours of ride time. Limited to a group of ten riders. Each rider will receive individual instruction and time working our cowtrack flag and cattle. He will also work on fundamental to advanced reined work.



# From our Farrier: Hoof Balance

As a farrier balance is one of the most important parts of my job. A properly balanced hoof will insure proper hoof

growth as well as joint alignment. A lack of proper balance in young horse can cause improper growth patterns in the hoof as well as the legs. Bad joint alignment can cause premature arthritis and even tendon, ligament, and muscle injuries. Good hoof Balance is paramount to a healthy and sound horse.

So it is my job and responsibility to determine the best way to properly trim a hoof to achieve balance. There are several different things to consider in this process. Generally we look at a hoof from the front. The foot is stationary preferably on a flat and clean surface. We are looking at the hairline or coronet band as well as the length of hoof. This will help determine lateral or side to side balance.



This the front view of a hoof that was let go a little long. Notice the length of the hoof on the left side compared to the right. Also notice the imperfect or wavy hairline.



After a properly balanced trim.

We then look at the foot from the side. This will give us an idea of hoof angle and balance front to back. Hoof angle is the angle of the very front of the hoof in relation to the ground. Generally a front foot will be around 55 degrees and a hind will be slightly steeper at 57 degrees. Of course each horse is different and may vary slightly. The goal here is to properly align the hoof with the lower limb insuring proper joint alignment.



Notice the excessive length. The hoof has migrated forward causing an improper alignment and a lack of support for the limb.

At some point I like to see a horse move to determine dynamic balance. Most generally we want to make sure a hoof is tracking properly and landing flat. So now we pick the foot up and after cleaning up any excess sole and trimming the frog we allow the foot to hang and check the ground service of the hoof. It's important to leave the leg in under the horse where it travels and not pull it out and away from the horse.



These two photos are of the same hoof. This one is pulled away from the horse making it appear more balanced than it is.



This one is positioned more naturally under horse showing an obviously high outside (lateral) heel.

Taking all this visual information into consideration will usually give us an idea how much foot to trim and where. As we begin to trim we like to determine the center of the hoof which is generally a thumbs with behind the point of a normal frog. The goal is symmetry front to back and side to side.

As you can see there is much to consider when trying to achieve proper balance. All horses grow different at different rates and different areas. It is super important to keep your horses feet on a regular maintenance schedule to help make sure they stay balanced and healthy now and for years to come.

#### The Horse's Perspective

Verbal Communication Pitfalls

Communication is a common problem between horse and rider. It isn't something that is frequently talked about so it can be often overlooked. It is something that I was never taught or even heard discussed in my riding career. It wasn't until I started helping other's with their horse troubles that it dawned on me. Horses don't speak English! It's a regular occurrence I see, someone having a hard time getting their horse to do something, even if they've done it before or have been working on it for a great deal of time. Horses hear sounds from us, not words.

So if you're saying "back" as quickly as you can, your horse is going to have trouble differentiating that from you saying "whoa" as quickly as you can. If you elongate your words and enunciate them more, you will be setting your horse up for success in understanding you. The other communication barrier I frequently see is people having the same cue with more than one meaning. You wouldn't ask someone to give you a fork and then continue to ask the same question until they brought you a spoon, right? They're both eating utensils but we have different words for them because they serve a different purpose. So why cluck/kick for a trot then repeat until the horse breaks into a lope/canter? All you're doing there is asking for more and more speed until the horse breaks from the trot into the lope. What should be done is cluck for a trot and kissing for a lope, and only a lope. Having one cue per action (trotting, loping, backing, whoa, stepping over, picking up a foot etc.) is vital for you and your horse to have proper communication and to work smoothly together as a team!

Beth heads up the colt starting program here at Equus Curito. With over 200 colts under her belt she has developed her own unique approach that puts the horse first, while reaching goals in a structured and timely manner. You will be seeing more articles and tips from her in the future on developing these young horses.
